
March Magic!!

Forster-Tuncurry's Transition

NOVA Forster-Tuncurry recently witnessed ABILITY in action when Transition to Work Job Coach Tracy Steele invited Liesl Tesch to speak about her experiences and WorkCover.

The visit to the Tuncurry office drew a large crowd of job seekers and potential job seekers from Transition to Work in Forster-Tuncurry, Taree and Port Macquarie. Local schools were also represented, all involved with NOVA.



Liesl Tesch was just 19 years old when she crashed her bicycle, falling two metres onto a cement driveway. She suffered a broken back and was told she would never walk again

Against all the odds Liesl went on to become a member of Australia's successful Women's National Wheelchair Basketball League.

Among the most decorated and respected members of the Australian team, five-time Paralympian Liesl Tesch is continuing her quest for an elusive gold medal. Since retiring from wheelchair basketball and taking up sailing in January 2011, Liesl has already proven she is as adept at her new sport as she was at her old.



Aiming for gold, the Gliders left Beijing 2008 with a bronze medal which has only inspired Liesl to continue her dream of gold through sailing. By the end of her sporting career she hopes to have a Paralympics medal in every colour.

Trainees learnt about WorkCover and the need for workplace safety and were able to offer up suggestions of their own during the workshop section.

Liesl inspired and motivated the trainees and team members who felt that anything is possible. This kind of encouragement is an example of the work done with NOVA trainees to lift them out of thinking of a disability and into thinking of CAN-DO-ABILITY.

Guest Speaker, Carol M Schall, Ph.D

The challenges of supporting individuals through transition from school to adult life are many.

In this seminar you will learn about the characteristics of individuals with autism in adolescence and the essential person centred program components and curriculum adjustments needed to support individuals with

autism in primary and high school, higher education and in adult service agencies.

Dr Schall has been learning from and supporting individuals with autism since the early 1980's. She is involved in supporting individuals across Virginia through her work as the director of technical assistance at Virginia Commonwealth University Autism Centre for Excellence.

She is well versed in completing functional behaviour assessments and using positive behaviour supports to develop comprehensive plans for individuals from a person-centred approach. She is a state trainer for the Positive Behaviour Support project with the Partnership for People with Disabilities at Virginia Commonwealth University. Finally, she is the principal investigator for the VCU ASD Career Links Project.

Her research interests include the monitoring of psychotropic medication for individuals with autism spectrum disorders, transition from school to work and adulthood, and training for parents and professionals on serving individuals with developmental disabilities.

Paula Duncan has worked extensively on stage, film and television, and has been a household name throughout Australia for over half of her life, not only as an actress but as one of Australia's most loved personalities.
